MINUTES - AUGUST 14, 2009

CALL TO ORDER: (A.)

Vice Chair Braun called the August 14, 2009, meeting to order at 10:05 am at 700 SW Harrison, Auditorium A, Suite 450, Topeka, Kansas. Commissioners Braun, Falstad, and Schwan were present at the meeting. Commissioners Sader and McKechnie participated by telephone. Others present included Executive Director Stephen Martino; Director of Audit/Electronic Security Charles LaBoy; Director of Security Don Brownlee; Director of Communications/Responsible Gaming Mike Deines; Director of Administration Don Cawby; Special Assistant Attorney General Jay Hall, Commission Recording Secretary Linda Pendarvis and other staff.

AMENDMENTS TO THE AGENDA: (B.)

Mr. Martino suggested the following amendments to the agenda:

- (D.) no report from the Kansas Lottery
- (J.1.) no need for attorney-client communication

MOTION, APPROVE AGENDA: (B.)

Commissioner Falstad (Schwan) moved to approve the agenda as amended and re-number the agenda accordingly. Motion passed unanimously.

MOTION, APPROVE JULY 17, 2009 MEETING MINUTES: (C.) One sentence under (I.1.) was expanded to add, ". . . on the revocation of parimutuel licenses." Commissioner Schwan (Falstad) moved to approve the minutes of the July 17, 2009, commission meeting as amended. Motion passed unanimously.

LOTTERY GAMING FACILITY REPORTS/ITEMS: (D.) The commission heard Clark Stewart, president of Butler National Corporation d/b/a Boot Hill Casino and Resort. Mr. Stewart provided a hand-out with illustrations of construction progress to date. He reported that construction remains on target with the building ready in late October and opening for December. Staffing is in process and is estimated to number 286 people when the facility opens. Gaming machines will be ordered by the end of next week with expected arrival between the middle of October and the middle of November. Systems are currently being tested.

COUNTY FAIR RACING REPORTS: (E.)

- 1. The commission heard Rita Osborn report on the Eureka Downs horse meet. The meet increased from six to 10 days. Attendance was almost double what it was last year.
- 2. Dan Bird reported on the horse/greyhound meet at Anthony Downs. Total figures have not been finalized, but attendance was nearly double what it was last year. This was the second best year for attendance and handle in 16 years.
- 3. Brandi Baer presented the Parimutuel Auditor Report.
- 4. Dr. Patrick Regier presented the Animal Health Report.

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5. Charles LaBoy presented the Steward/Judge report.

STAFF REPORT, MARTINO: (H.1.) The commission heard a staff report from Mr. Martino:

- KRGC, the Lottery Commission, and Boot Hill are now having a bi-weekly conference call. The first call has taken place and was positive and productive.
- KRGC executive staff has also begun meeting bi-weekly with the Lottery Commission to discuss issues of mutual interest.
- The hiring process for enforcement officers at Dodge City has begun. Those positions are anticipated to be filled by mid-October.
- Staff is in the process of scheduling Review Board meetings. The Lottery has until August 28 to complete contract negotiations. The Review Board will be meeting in Wyandotte and Sumner counties.
- There is a possibility that the October commission meeting could be in Abilene and the November and December meetings in Dodge City. Details will be provided as they become available.

STAFF REPORT, DEINES: (H.2.) The commission heard a staff report from Mr. Deines:

- KRGC's voluntary exclusion program is now up and running, having been kicked off in Dodge City on August 6.
- KRGC staff participated in the observation of National Responsible Gambling Awareness Week in Dodge City last week. Events included an intercession class on expanded gaming through K-State and a community forum.
- The help line for the Kansas Responsible Gambling Alliance is now up and running and a new website will be operational in the next 30 days. The help line is 800-522-4700, and the web site is www.ksgamblinghelp.com.

STAFF REPORT, CAWBY: (H.3.) The commission heard a staff report from Mr. Cawby:

- Budget wrap-up for FY 2009
 - o KRGC voluntarily reduced its budget by \$2.15 million from the gaming fund (37%).
 - o At the end of FY 2009 the agency came in another \$318,000 under budget projections (8.5%).
 - Total actual reduction from approved budget was 42%. Total reduction in expenditures was \$340,000 in the racing funds and \$3.3 million in gaming funds, for a total

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reduction of approximately 43.5%.

o FY 2009 ended with just over \$150,000 in the racing fund prior to having the final expenses from Eureka and Anthony. It is estimated that approximately \$59,000 will remain after all expenses are paid. About \$1.3 million remained in the gaming fund as of FY 2009 year end.

STAFF AGENDA MEMORANDUM

DATE OF MEETING: September 11, 2009

AGENDA ITEM: Review of FY 2010/FY 2011 Budget

PRESENTER: Don Cawby, Director of Administration

Neysa Thomas, Chief Fiscal Officer

ISSUE SUMMARY: The agencies annual budget must be submitted to the Division of the Budget on or before September 15, 2008. Prior to submittal, the Commission has to approve the Racing and Gaming Commission budget, as well as the State Gaming Agency budget.

Major items in the KRGC FY 2010 revised budget include:

- A request for a total of just over \$5.0 million from all funding sources and 49.6 FTE positions.
- A reduction of just under \$1.1 million in gaming fund operating expenses in FY 2010 (excluding debt service).
- The regulation of the Boot Hill Casino estimating an opening of December 15, 2009.
- Funding for the Lottery Gaming Facilities Review Board process.
- The closeout of racing operations.

Major items included in the KRGC FY 2011 revised budget include:

- A request for a total of approximately \$10.6 million from all funding sources and 69.0 FTE positions.
- Continuing regulation of the Boot Hill Casino for the full year.
- Regulation of a gaming facility in both Sumner and Wyandotte estimating an opening of January 1, 2011.
- An enhancement request of approximately \$100,000 and 1.0 FTE enforcement agent position for Illegal Gaming Enforcement Operations.
- A transfer to the Gaming Fund of \$645,231 from state gaming revenues to pay the unassigned startup costs (July 1, 2007 to Dec 31, 2008).
- Creation of three new funds, two of which were accidentally omitted from last year's bill.

COMMISSION ACTION REQUIRED/REQUESTED: Commission discussion, consideration and approval of the revised FY 2010 and FY 2011 budget request for the Racing & Gaming Commission and the State Gaming Agency.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS: Staff recommends approval of the proposed budget, subject to technical changes to be made upon entering the budget into IBARS, the State Budget System.

STAFF AGENDA MEMORANDUM

DATE OF MEETING: September 11, 2009

AGENDA ITEM: Final approval of gaming regulations 112-104-34 to -41,

generally regarding internal control standards for forms and

keys.

PRESENTER: Patrick D. Martin, Assistant Attorney General

ISSUE SUMMARY: These regulations establish industry standard controls for keys and forms. Such controls are already in place in other comparable gaming jurisdictions. The Commission preliminarily approved these additional control standards on March 13.

As background, these regulations carry out the Commission's duty to adopt "such rules and regulations as the commission deems necessary to carry out the duties and functions of the commission pursuant to Kansas expanded lottery act." K.S.A. 74-8772. And specifically, the Commission is required to create "provisions for oversight of all lottery gaming facility operations" including "oversight of internal controls." *Id.* at (e). These additional regulations comply with those duties.

Since the Commission's preliminary approval, these regulations have followed the rigorous process involved in creating permanent regulations. That is, these regulations have been vetted by the Department of Administration, the Attorney General's office, the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules and Regulations, and members of the regulated community. Suggested revisions from each entity have been adopted into the current sets of regulations.

COMMISSION ACTION REQUIRED/REQUESTED: Staff asks the Commission to conduct a **roll call vote** to approve K.A.R. 112-104-34 to -41.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS: Staff recommends approval of the regulations.

112-104-34. Physical key controls; automated key controls. (a) "Sensitive keys" shall mean those unlocking devices designated by the Kansas lottery, a facility manager, or the commission as important to preserving the security of the facility manager's business. Each facility manager shall control the storage, duplication, custody, issuance, and return of sensitive keys. The sensitive key box may be stored in each facility manager's accounting department. At a minimum, the following keys shall be deemed sensitive keys:

- (1) The EGM belly glass key;
- (2) the tip box key, sometimes called a "toke box" key; and
- (3) the accounting or audit box key.
- (b) Sensitive keys may be further designated as "critical." Critical keys shall mean those unlocking devices that shall be maintained in a dual-lock box. If a critical key is lost or becomes missing, all locks that the key fits shall be changed within 24 hours. At a minimum, the following keys shall be deemed critical keys:
 - (1) The EGM central processing unit key;
 - (2) the EGM main door key;
 - (3) the EGM drop door key;
 - (4) the bill validator door and box release key;
 - (5) the bill validator contents key;
 - (6) the jackpot or EGM reimpressment kiosk keys;
 - (7) the self-redemption or bill breaker kiosk keys;

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- (8) the change cart key;
- (9) the key for each table game's drop box;
- (10) the key for the table game drop box release;
- (11) the keys for the bill validator and table drop storage cart;
- (12) the key for each table game's chip bank cover;
- (13) the key for each table game's chip tray;
- (14) the key for each progressive game's controller;
- (15) the key for each progressive game's reset switch;
- (16) the keys for the reserve chip storage;
- (17) the keys for the card and dice storage area;
- (18) the keys for the secondary chip storage area;
- (19) the access door key to any cage, EGM bank, or redemption booth;
- (20) the window key to any cage, EGM bank, or redemption booth;
- (21) the keys to the vault;
- (22) the keys to the soft count room; and
- (23) any key not listed in this subsection that controls access to any cash or chip storage area.
- (c) If a facility manager chooses to use rings to maintain its keys, each key on the ring shall be individually identified on a key access list.
- (d) Each facility manager's internal control system shall include the following information:

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- (1) The location of each sensitive key and critical key box;
- (2) each employee or contract job title that is authorized to access the sensitive key or critical key boxes;
- (3) the procedure for issuing and controlling the keys for the sensitive key or critical key boxes;
- (4) the sensitive key or critical key names, location, and persons authorized to sign out each sensitive key or critical key;
 - (5) the location and custodian of each duplicate sensitive key; and
 - (6) continuous surveillance coverage of each key box.
- (e) If a facility manager chooses to use an automated key control system, the facility manager's internal control system shall include the following information:
- (1) A description of the automated system and its configuration, including how access is controlled;
- (2) the system's ability to provide scheduled and on-demand reports for a complete audit trail of all access, including the following:
 - (A) The identity of the key box;
 - (B) the identity of the employee;

(C) the identity of the keys;

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(D) the date and time a key was removed;

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- (E) the date and time a key was returned;
- (F) any unauthorized attempts to access the key box; and

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- (G) all entries, changes, or deletions in the system and the name of the employee performing the entry, change, or deletion;
 - (3) the employee position that is in charge of any automated key control system;
- (4) each employee position that is authorized to enter, modify, and delete any keys;
 - (5) each employee position that is authorized to access the system;
 - (6) details about the alarms being used to signal for the following events:
 - (A) Overdue keys:
 - (B) open key box doors;
 - (C) unauthorized attempts to access; and
 - (D) any other unusual activities;
 - (7) any system override procedures; and
- (8) a procedure for the notification of a commission security agent on duty if a partial or complete system failure occurs.
- (f) Each individual authorized to access keys in the automated system shall have the authorization noted in the employee's personnel file.
- (g) Each change to the list of authorized employees that have access to the automated keys shall be updated within 72 hours of the change. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-

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- 112-104-35. Key control procedures. (a) Each facility manager's internal controls for keys shall include a key box custodian. Each custodian of a sensitive key box or critical key box shall be issued a sensitive key or critical key access list that notes the authorized employee positions that may access each sensitive key or critical key.
- (b) If two keys are required to access a controlled area, then the keys shall be issued to different employees and each key shall be individually signed out of the key access list.
- (c) Each key that requires issuance under security or management escort shall be identified as such in the sensitive key or critical key access list. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-_____.)

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112-104-36. Key access list. (a) Each facility manager shall maintain a current and accurate key access list for each sensitive key or critical key. Each facility manager shall provide a copy of the key access list to the commission's director of security. The key access list shall include the following details:

- (1) The name of the key;
- (2) the storage location of the key;
- (3) the name of the custodian of the key;
- (4) the quantity of the keys;
- (5) the title of each employee authorized to remove the key; and
- (6) any escort requirements and specific limitations to key access.
- (b) The custodian of duplicate keys shall maintain a key access list documenting the following information:
 - (1) The name of the keys;
 - (2) the identification number assigned to the key;
 - (3) the employee positions that are authorized to remove a key; and
 - (4) any escort requirements for each key's use.
- (c) The internal control system for keys shall indicate which employees have the authority to make changes, deletions, or additions to the sensitive key and critical key access lists. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-

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112-104-37. Key log. (a) Any sensitive key or critical key may be issued only after completion of a sensitive key or critical key log. The key log shall include the following information:

- (1) The date the key was issued or returned;
- (2) the key number;
- (3) the individual or automated key box issuing the key;
- (4) the individual receiving the key;
- (5) the time the key was signed out or removed;
- (6) the time the key was signed in;
- (7) the individual returning the key; and
- (8) the individual or automated key box receiving the returned key.
- (b) Each individual who signs out a sensitive key or a critical key shall maintain custody of the key until the key is returned to the sensitive key or the critical key box.

 Keys may be passed only to count team leads and distributed to other count team members during bill validator drops and EGM drops. In the event of an emergency, illness, or injury rendering the individual incapable of returning the key, a supervisor may return the key with a notation on the sensitive key log.
- (c) Upon completion, sensitive key or critical key logs shall be forwarded at intervals specified by the facility manager to the accounting or internal audit department, where the logs shall be reviewed and retained. If any discrepancies are found in the key

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logs, the security or internal auditing department shall begin an investigation and document the discrepancy.

- (d) Each facility manager shall maintain a duplicate key inventory log documenting the current issuance, receipt, and inventory of all duplicate sensitive keys.

 The duplicate key inventory log shall include the following information:
 - (1) The date and time of the key issuance, receipt, or inventory;
 - (2) each key name;
 - (3) each key number;
 - (4) the number of keys in beginning inventory;
 - (5) the number of keys added or removed;
 - (6) the number of keys in ending inventory;
 - (7) the reason for adding or removing keys; and
- (8) the signatures of the two individuals accessing the box. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-_____.)

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112-104-38. Broken, lost, or missing keys. (a) The internal control system shall include procedures for the following if a critical key or sensitive key is broken:

- (1) The name of the employee required to receive and replace the broken key;
- (2) disposition of the broken key; and
- (3) notification to a commission agent on duty.
- (b) An inventory of duplicate keys shall be maintained in such quantity that there is always at least one duplicate key in inventory for each critical key or sensitive key.
- (c) The internal control system shall include procedures to be followed when a sensitive key or critical key is lost, missing, or taken from the premises.
- (d) The internal control system shall include procedures for investigating and reporting missing critical keys or sensitive keys. The commission agent on duty shall be notified upon discovery that any sensitive keys or critical keys are missing. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-_____.)

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112-104-39. Corrections to forms. (a) Monetary corrections to a figure originally recorded on a form may be made only in ink by performing the following:

- (1) Crossing out the error;
- (2) entering the correct figure; and
- (3) obtaining the initials of the employee making the change and the initials of the employee's supervisor.
- (b) Each nonmonetary correction to a form shall be initialed by the employee making the correction.
- (c) Each form that is not prenumbered shall be maintained and controlled by the applicable department manager. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2008 Supp. 74-8772; effective P-_____.)

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112-104-40. Manual form dispensers. (a) Each facility manager's accounting or security department shall be responsible for loading and unloading any locked manual form dispenser. Each form unloaded from the dispenser shall be delivered directly to the accounting department.

- (b) If the manual form dispenser jams, an employee from the accounting department or security department shall clear the jam and relock the manual form dispenser.

We are providing information regarding the extension of the Woodlands license as requested by the commission at the July 17th meeting and as outlined in your letter dated August 4, 2009. We feel it is critical to the racing industry for the racetracks to retain their licenses through the next legislative session in order to have standing before the legislature while seeking amendments to Senate Bill 66.

1. A plan to reopen each race that has a license. This plan should include details for construction; hiring of management, race officials and staff; and what specifically needs to be accomplished before live racing can commence.

Fortunately the Woodlands had completed much of the preliminary work for the addition of casino gaming prior to closing the facility in August 2008. Following is the status of items that needs to be accomplished before the facility can be reopened:

Construction

- The architectural and engineering plans have been completed and forwarded to the KRGC for approval. We currently do not envision any substantive changes to the plans other than construction issues that may have to be addressed regarding reopening facilities that have stood vacant for a period of time.
- Construction bids were let and forwarded to the KRGC for approval. These bids are no longer valid and will have to be let again before construction can proceed. We are confident the previous bidders will still be interested in the project and that the bidding process will be brief as each bidder will only have to review their submissions for pricing changes in material and labor. Considering the reduction in number and size of construction projects currently underway and the present economic conditions we are hopeful the bids will be lower than the originals. We anticipate the construction period to be approximately six months with an additional one month for final equipment installation and employee training.
- We understand that we are required to submit changes that become necessary, for the approval of the KRGC as well as to the Unified Government of Wyandotte County.

- · Hiring of Management, Race Officials and Staff
 - o The Woodlands has retained its general manager and a small contingent of security and maintenance employees. We also still maintain our corporate staff that have been involved with gaming for a number of years and will be aiding in the reopening efforts.
 - Department managers directly related to the casino will be hired approximately four to five months prior to the opening of the casino. We maintain contact with our previous management staff and are confident that we will not experience difficulty recruiting and hiring qualified candidates to form the management team for the gaming operation.
 - Staff employees directly related to the casino will be hired approximately one to three months prior to the opening of the casino. We maintain contact with our previous staff and are confident we can attract numerous qualified applicants especially given the current downturn in employment opportunities.
 - o Department managers directly related to live racing and simulcast will be hired approximately four to five months prior to the opening of live racing for their specific breed. We maintain contact with our previous management staff and are confident that we will not experience difficulty recruiting and hiring qualified candidates to form the management team for the racing operation.
 - Staff employees directly related to live racing and simulcast will be hired approximately one to three months prior to the opening of live racing for their specific breed. We maintain contact with our previous staff and are confident we can attract numerous qualified applicants especially given the current downturn in employment opportunities.
 - We understand that licensing the above employees will be a much larger task for the reopening due to the sheer numbers than had been anticipated with the previous plan. We are committed to work with the KRGC and staff to make that the most efficient process that we can.
- Additional Items Required before the Commencement of Live Racing
 - O Work with our non-profit and representatives of the breeds to ensure we are in agreement with the required amendments for Senate Bill 66. It is a consensus among the group that the target for completion is no later than December 31, 2009.
 - We must negotiate a final contract with the Kansas Lottery based on the amendments we are able to obtain to Senate Bill 66. A basic contract had been worked on previously and we would hope that most of that ground work would stay in place for this effort. The Lottery has been great to work with and we do not anticipate any major stumbling blocks to finalizing an agreement. Additionally we will have to submit the Lottery Management Agreement to the KRGC and the Kansas Lottery Commission for approval.
 - Our original pari-mutuel license, issued in 1988 1989, is set to expire in 2013.
 In order to accommodate the term of the Lottery Management Agreement we will have to request the KRGC adjust the term of our pari-mutuel license.

 We must file our background gaming application forms and successfully complete our background investigation. Most of the application has been completed and will only require updating prior to submission.

- We must secure financing on favorable terms to make the project a success. Given the restrictive nature of the current lending markets it is possible that we will finance the project internally. Additionally we will have to submit the financing arrangements to the KRGC for approval.
- We must work with the KRGC and Lottery to ensure we understand the fees and expenses the racetrack will be responsible for.
- 2. A timeline to restart racing. This timeline should detail construction; hiring; acquisition of necessary equipment; and when live racing, both greyhound and horses, if applicable, will restart.

Please see the attached timeline for anticipated lengths of time for each line item as well as the order we believe they will occur. We have included number of months to complete as well as superimposed a calendar beginning in October of this year with final legislation in April of 2010 and casino opening in March 2011 followed ninety days later with the resumption of live racing and simulcasting.

An active agreement between each track's organization and facility licensee.

The agreement between the Woodlands and TRAK East expired in the fall of 2008 approximately the same time as the initial KRGC hearings were held regarding the extension of the Woodlands license. We continue to work together based on the expired agreement and will officially renew the agreement when both parties have a better understanding of what the amended legislation entails. On August 18, 2009 we met with the TRAK East board to discuss our efforts to extend our licenses through the next legislative session as well as the amendments we would be seeking to Senate Bill 66. It was a successful meeting culminating in the board voting to support our efforts with a request for extension and to forward a letter to the KRGC stating said support, please see attached letter.

In addition to meeting with TRAK East on August 18th we also met with representatives of the horse and dog industries to discuss support for an extension of the Woodlands license and plans for our legislative efforts. The breeds agreed to discuss with their membership supporting our request for an extension and to forward a letter to the KRGC stating support based on the membership's consensus. I have attached the letter of support we have already received from the Kansas Thoroughbred Association.

We believe it is imperative for the racetracks to retain their license through the next legislative session. Further in the meetings all parties committed to crafting and agreeing to amended legislation prior to the end of the year so we could present a unified front to the legislature and reopen live racing as soon as possible.

4. If the reopening of a racetrack is contingent on the passage of additional gaming legislation, please note that. Since timelines cannot be constructed for an uncertain future date, I would encourage that your timelines specify the length of time it will take to achieve certain events, such as construction, hiring, equipment purchases and commencement of racing, from the passage of any statutory change.

The reopening of the Woodlands is contingent on the passage of additional gaming legislation that provides the track owners confidence the racetrack and casino will be economically viable. The attached timeline contains a row at the top of the chart showing events as they relate to

the final legislation, for example the casino opens at 11 months and live greyhound racing commences at 14 months.

Kansas Racing, LLC respectfully requests the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission reviews the information we have provided above and finds favorably in the extension of our pari-mutuel license through the next legislative session.

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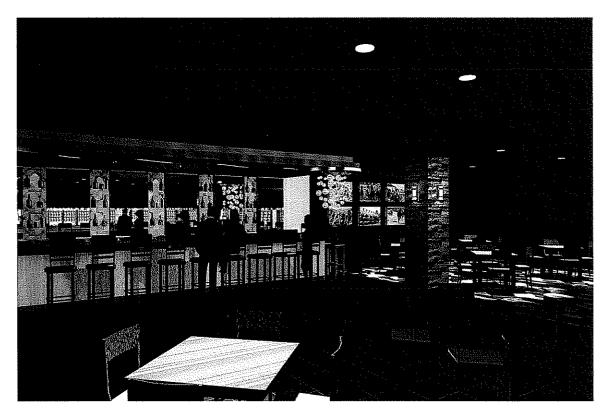




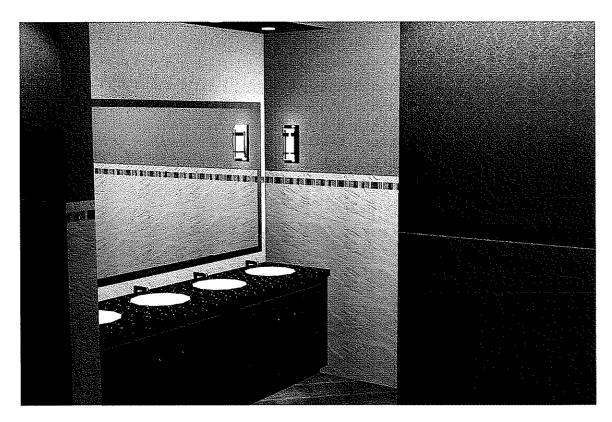

RE-OPENING PLAN FOR WICHITA GREYHOUND PARK

The following re-opening plan is submitted to the members of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission through Executive Director Steve Martino. The purpose of this plan is to conform with the motion passed by the Commission during their July 17, 2009 meeting, and as detailed in the letter dated August 4, 2009 by the Executive Director.

To achieve the extension contemplated in the motion and Executive Director letter the following submission is made.

This re-opening plan is contingent upon passage of legislation. The legislative relief should provide for changes in revenue distribution that allows for an appropriate return on the facilities. Two triggers are contemplated for the re-opening plan for Wichita Greyhound Park; the final passage and signature of the legislation referenced above and after the passage of a ballot initiative in Sedgwick County:

1. A plan to reopen each racetrack that has a license. Within 60 days of the amendment is published in the State Registry, a construction and renovation plan will be submitted for the Commission's consideration.

Executive management is in place for the facility. The general manager will be named within 30 days of the passage of the ballot initiative. Director of Gaming will be named within 30 days of the passage of the ballot initiative. The hiring timeline for race officials and staff will commensurate with the proposed race dates, which will be submitted within 90 days of the certification of the election.

- 2. A timeline to restart racing. The renovation (construction) timeline is forecasted at 180 days to ready the facility to accommodate electronic gaming. Following the completion of the renovation phase, the facility will begin to accept slot machines from approved vendors, furniture, fixtures, and other operations equipment. This phase is expected at 45 days.
- 3. An active agreement between each track's organization and facility licensee. The management agreement with Wichita Greyhound Park, Inc. and Wichita Greyhound Charities, Inc. was not terminated and is in force. Both parties believe that there will be an "active agreement" by the September 3, 2009 response target date.

4. Reopening the racetrack is contingent on the two triggers referenced above.

Timelines for certain events once proposed legislation is signed into law:

Renovation Plan to KRGC – 60 days Ballot Initiative – 90 days

Timelines for certain events from certification of the election in Sedgwick County:

Construction

Mobilization – 30 days Construction – 180 days (30 days from election certification) FF&E / Training – 45 days (210 days from election certification)

The following racing plan is submitted to the members of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission through Executive Director Steve Martino. The purpose of this plan is to conform with the motion passed by the Commission during their July 17, 2009 meeting, and as detailed in the letter dated August 4, 2009 by the Executive Director.

To achieve the extension contemplated in the motion and Executive Director letter the following submission is made.

Wichita Greyhound Park, Inc. and Wichita Greyhound Charities, Inc. jointly propose a race dates submission within 60 days after a successful ballot initiative in Sedgwick County resulting from the final passage and signature of the previously referenced proposed legislation. As this plan is conditional on the passage of this amendment and a successful ballot initiative, it is not possible to provide specific proposed race dates until these conditions are met. Both organizations are sincerely committed to propose race dates once the conditions of the re-opening plan are met, and will do so once timelines for an opening date are more apparent.

RE-OPENING PLAN FOR CAMPTOWN GREYHOUND PARK

The following reopening plan is submitted to the members of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission through Executive Director Steve Martino. The purpose of this plan is to conform with the motion passed by the Commission during their July 17, 2009 meeting, and as detailed in the letter dated August 4, 2009 by the Executive Director.

To achieve the extension contemplated in the motion and Executive Director letter the following submission is made.

This re-opening plan is contingent upon passage of legislation. The legislative relief should provide for changes in revenue distribution that allows for an appropriate return on the facilities. Once the amended legislation is published in the State Registry, this will trigger the commencement of the following re-opening plan:

1. A plan to reopen each racetrack that has a license. Within 30 days of final passage and signature of the Act referenced above construction will commence again at Camptown. The general contractor has indicated this amount of time to re-bid and re-mobilize construction personnel. No substantial changes to the facility are planned from the previously submitted and approved facility renovation.

Executive management is in place for the facility. The general manager of parimutuel operations will resume his duties within 14 days of the passage of the amendment. Director of gaming will be named within 30 days. The hiring timeline for race officials and staff will commensurate with the proposed race dates, which will be submitted within 60 days of signature of the amendment into law.

- 2. A timeline to restart racing. The construction timeline previously submitted and approved has 150 calendar days (180 total after law change) to complete the facility and have it ready for occupation. The general contractor does not foresee any issues resuming this schedule. Following the completion of the construction phase, the facility will begin to accept slot machines from approved vendors, furniture, fixtures, and other operations equipment. This phase is expected at 30 days (210 total after law change).
- 3. An active agreement between each track's organization and facility licensee. The Camptown Greyhound Park management agreement with TRAK SE dated August 1, 2007, previously submitted and approved by the Commission is in the

re-activation process. Both parties believe that there will be an "active agreement" by the September 3, 2009 response date.

4. Reopening the racetrack is contingent on the passage of additional gaming legislation. Timelines for certain events once proposed legislation is signed into law:

Construction

Remobilization – 30 days Construction – 150 days (180 days from law change) FF&E / Training – 30 days (210 days from law change)

Hiring

Construction personnel – 30 days Key Managers – 90 to 120 days Kennels – 180 days Support Staff – 120 to 180 days

Equipment Purchases

Resolution

Upon consideration of the Board of Directors of the Kansas Greyhound Association on September 3rd, 2009, the board makes the following findings in regards to a plan presented to the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission for the reopening of the Wichita Greyhound Park and Camptown Greyhound Park.

- 1.) We have confidence in the commitment to move forward, and the financial capability of the Ruffin Companies to execute this plan as described. Mr. Ruffin has been consistent in his commitment to reopen his tracks if legislation passes amending the gaming legislation as proposed.
- 2.) Though the plan itself does not explicitly define legislation to be proposed to the legislature in the upcoming session, the fact that the bill is already in place with key issues defined provides a clear understanding of the expectations regarding the legislative issues. The Kansas Greyhound Association worked closely with representatives of the Ruffin Companies in drafting the original legislation and subsequent amendments, and continues to meet with legislators on the key provisions. Attached to this resolution is the bill draft upon which our endorsement is based.
- 3.) While none of our board members are experts on construction issues, we believe the estimates provided represent a good faith effort to provide guidance on the schedules involved, and reflect a workable timetable for reopening.
- 4.) In terms of racing days, no changes in current law are proposed in the bill draft proposed last year and adopted for the upcoming session. Current law specifies the required days of racing, with a provision to negotiate a different schedule subject to approval of the Greyhound Breed Registry and the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. The Kansas Greyhound Association is willing to work with the tracks on scheduling issues to provide mutual benefit to both tracks and greyhound operators. The scope and type of schedule is wholly reliant on which tracks ultimately open, and the success of those facilities.

The Kansas Greyhound Association Board, for the reasons outlined in this resolution formally endorse the proposed plan for reopening both the Wichita Greyhound Park and Camptown Greyhound Park, and respectfully request that the commission grant an extension of the license revocation until an appropriate time following the conclusion of the next legislative session.

I move that the commission extend the deadline for the revocation of the parimutuel licenses of The Racing Association of Kansas East, Kansas Racing LLC, The Racing Association of Kansas Southeast, Wichita Greyhound Park Inc. (Camptown), Wichita Greyhound Park Inc. and Wichita Greyhound Charities Inc. for sixty days to allow the licensees to provide proposed race dates and a reopening plan to the commission. If no race dates or re-opening plan is provided at that time, the licenses shall be automatically revoked.

Our company is sincerely committed in retaining its licenses for the Wichita Greyhound Park and Camptown Greyhound Park. To that end, under this cover, you will find both a re-opening plan and racing plan for both facilities. It is my hope that you, Chairman Sader and the other members of the Commission will accept this proposal in the manner it is submitted, in the spirit of cooperation and to re-open our facilities contingent on the passage of amended legislation to make these operations financially viable.

We would invite the opportunity discuss the submissions with you at your convenience, prior to the September 11, 2009 meeting of the Commission, should you have any questions. We believe this submission will meet the requirements of the Commission and your letter dated August 4, 2009. We look forward to working with your agency in the future and our commitment to resuming operations at both facilities once proposed legislation is enacted.

Dear Licensees:

At its July 17 meeting, the Racing and Gaming Commission extended by 60 days the revocation date of each of your licenses to give you an opportunity to provide the commission with additional information. The commission's motion and the discussion afterward highlighted that the submission must include the following information:

1. A plan to reopen each racetrack that has a license. This plan should include details for construction; hiring of management, race officials and staff; and what specifically needs to be accomplished before live racing can commence.

- 2. A timeline to restart racing. This timeline should detail construction; hiring; acquisition of necessary equipment; and when live racing, both greyhound and horses, if applicable, will restart.
- 3. An active agreement between each track's organization and facility licensee.
- 4. If the reopening of a racetrack is contingent on the passage of additional gaming legislation, please note that. Since timelines cannot be constructed for an uncertain future date, I would encourage that your timelines specify the length of time it will take to achieve certain events, such as construction, hiring, equipment purchases and commencement of racing, from passage of any statutory change.

These submissions are subject to the consideration and approval of the commission. The extended deadline is now September 21. However, I believe that the commission would like to address these issues at its September 11 meeting. To that end, we request that you submit any information responsive to the commission's motion to our office no later than noon, September 3, so it can be included in the agenda packet. If that is not possible, please contact me.

RE-OPENING PLAN FOR WICHITA GREYHOUND PARK

The following re-opening plan is submitted to the members of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission through Executive Director Steve Martino. The purpose of this plan is to conform with the motion passed by the Commission during their July 17, 2009 meeting, and as detailed in the letter dated August 4, 2009 by the Executive Director.

To achieve the extension contemplated in the motion and Executive Director letter the following submission is made.

This re-opening plan is contingent upon passage of legislation. The legislative relief should provide for changes in revenue distribution that allows for an appropriate return on the facilities. Two triggers are contemplated for the re-opening plan for Wichita Greyhound Park; the final passage and signature of the legislation referenced above and after the passage of a ballot initiative in Sedgwick County:

1. A plan to reopen each racetrack that has a license. Within 60 days of the amendment is published in the State Registry, a construction and renovation plan will be submitted for the Commission's consideration.

Executive management is in place for the facility. The general manager will be named within 30 days of the passage of the ballot initiative. Director of Gaming will be named within 30 days of the passage of the ballot initiative. The hiring timeline for race officials and staff will commensurate with the proposed race dates, which will be submitted within 90 days of the certification of the election.

- 2. A timeline to restart racing. The renovation (construction) timeline is forecasted at 180 days to ready the facility to accommodate electronic gaming. Following the completion of the renovation phase, the facility will begin to accept slot machines from approved vendors, furniture, fixtures, and other operations equipment. This phase is expected at 45 days.
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4. Reopening the racetrack is contingent on the two triggers referenced above.

Timelines for certain events once proposed legislation is signed into law:

Renovation Plan to KRGC – 60 days Ballot Initiative – 90 days

Timelines for certain events from certification of the election in Sedgwick County:

Construction

Wichita Greyhound Park, Inc. and Wichita Greyhound Charities, Inc. jointly propose a race dates submission within 60 days after a successful ballot initiative in Sedgwick County resulting from the final passage and signature of the previously referenced proposed legislation. As this plan is conditional on the passage of this amendment and a successful ballot initiative, it is not possible to provide specific proposed race dates until these conditions are met. Both organizations are sincerely committed to propose race dates once the conditions of the re-opening plan are met, and will do so once timelines for an opening date are more apparent.

RE-OPENING PLAN FOR CAMPTOWN GREYHOUND PARK

The following reopening plan is submitted to the members of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission through Executive Director Steve Martino. The purpose of this plan is to conform with the motion passed by the Commission during their July 17, 2009 meeting, and as detailed in the letter dated August 4, 2009 by the Executive Director.

To achieve the extension contemplated in the motion and Executive Director letter the following submission is made.

This re-opening plan is contingent upon passage of legislation. The legislative relief should provide for changes in revenue distribution that allows for an appropriate return on the facilities. Once the amended legislation is published in the State Registry, this will trigger the commencement of the following re-opening plan:

1. A plan to reopen each racetrack that has a license. Within 30 days of final passage and signature of the Act referenced above construction will commence again at Camptown. The general contractor has indicated this amount of time to re-bid and re-mobilize construction personnel. No substantial changes to the facility are planned from the previously submitted and approved facility renovation.

Executive management is in place for the facility. The general manager of parimutuel operations will resume his duties within 14 days of the passage of the amendment. Director of gaming will be named within 30 days. The hiring timeline for race officials and staff will commensurate with the proposed race dates, which will be submitted within 60 days of signature of the amendment into law.

- 2. A timeline to restart racing. The construction timeline previously submitted and approved has 150 calendar days (180 total after law change) to complete the facility and have it ready for occupation. The general contractor does not foresee any issues resuming this schedule. Following the completion of the construction phase, the facility will begin to accept slot machines from approved vendors, furniture, fixtures, and other operations equipment. This phase is expected at 30 days (210 total after law change).
- 3. An active agreement between each track's organization and facility licensee. The Camptown Greyhound Park management agreement with TRAK SE dated August 1, 2007, previously submitted and approved by the Commission is in the

re-activation process. Both parties believe that there will be an "active agreement" by the September 3, 2009 response date.

4. Reopening the racetrack is contingent on the passage of additional gaming legislation. Timelines for certain events once proposed legislation is signed into law:

Construction

Remobilization – 30 days Construction – 150 days (180 days from law change) FF&E / Training – 30 days (210 days from law change)

Hiring

Construction personnel – 30 days Key Managers – 90 to 120 days Kennels – 180 days Support Staff – 120 to 180 days

Equipment Purchases

Racing Equipment Lease/Purchase – 90 days Gaming Equipment – 90 to 120 days FF&E – 60 to 120 days

Target Opening Date

210 days from proposed legislation is signed into law

Upon consideration of the Board of Directors of the Kansas Greyhound Association on September 3rd, 2009, the board makes the following findings in regards to a plan presented to the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission for the reopening of the Wichita Greyhound Park and Camptown Greyhound Park.

- 1.) We have confidence in the commitment to move forward, and the financial capability of the Ruffin Companies to execute this plan as described. Mr. Ruffin has been consistent in his commitment to reopen his tracks if legislation passes amending the gaming legislation as proposed.
- 2.) Though the plan itself does not explicitly define legislation to be proposed to the legislature in the upcoming session, the fact that the bill is already in place with key issues defined provides a clear understanding of the expectations regarding the legislative issues. The Kansas Greyhound Association worked closely with representatives of the Ruffin Companies in drafting the original legislation and subsequent amendments, and continues to meet with legislators on the key provisions. Attached to this resolution is the bill draft upon which our endorsement is based.
- 3.) While none of our board members are experts on construction issues, we believe the estimates provided represent a good faith effort to provide guidance on the schedules involved, and reflect a workable timetable for reopening.
- 4.) In terms of racing days, no changes in current law are proposed in the bill draft proposed last year and adopted for the upcoming session. Current law specifies the required days of racing, with a provision to negotiate a different schedule subject to approval of the Greyhound Breed Registry and the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. The Kansas Greyhound Association is willing to work with the tracks on scheduling issues to provide mutual benefit to both tracks and greyhound operators. The scope and type of schedule is wholly reliant on which tracks ultimately open, and the success of those facilities.

The Kansas Greyhound Association Board, for the reasons outlined in this resolution formally endorse the proposed plan for reopening both the Wichita Greyhound Park and Camptown Greyhound Park, and respectfully request that the commission grant an extension of the license revocation until an appropriate time following the conclusion of the next legislative session.
